RECREATION DEPT. TO CHARGE FOR MEMBERSHIPS BEGINNING APRIL 4

The Detroit Recreation Department began charging a nominal membership fee effective April 4. The fee is designed to be affordable for families and allows recreation centers to generate additional funding for programs and activities.

If you have a current membership, it will remain valid through 2011. New members will be assessed: \$5 for youth ages 6-12; \$7 for teens ages 13-17; \$10 for adults ages 18-49; \$6 for adults ages 50-59; and free for seniors ages 60 and up.

CITY ADJUSTS HOURS FOR DROP-OFF LOCATIONS; START YARD WASTE COLLECTION

On Monday, April 4, the City of Detroit’s Department of Public Works switched to spring/summer hours at its four drop-off locations. A fifth location, J. Fons Transfer Station is open, as well. Residents can use the drop-off locations to discard bulk items, yard waste and recyclable items.

DPW crews will collect yard waste at homes – leaves, grass clippings, and twigs — on the same day as the weekly trash collection, beginning April 4. Yard waste must be placed at the curb in **biodegradable paper bags or a personal garbage can. DPW will not collect yard waste in plastic bags.**

DETROIT RESIDENTS CAN SAVE WITH PRESCRIPTION DISCOUNT CARD

Detroit residents are encouraged to sign up for a prescription discount card that may allow them to save an average of 20 percent off regular retail prices for drugs at participating pharmacies. The card offers savings on prescription drugs to residents who do not have health insurance or a traditional benefits plan, or who have prescriptions that are not covered by insurance. The card is free to all Detroit residents, regardless of age, income or existing

health insurance.

The prescription discount card is available to residents through the City Clerk’s Office in collaboration with the National League of Cities (NLC) in Washington, D.C. Residents may obtain a card from either location of the City Clerk’s office listed below, or from participating CVS Pharmacies located in Detroit.

Sherwood Forest has two organizations, the Sherwood Forest Association and the Sherwood Forest Patrol. We invite you to join both groups, as both are vital to the well-being of our community.

The Sherwood Forest Association

Membership dollars work everyday to make our neighborhood a better place to live. We use annual dues:

- To communicate via the *Tattler*, the *This Old House* list and the business directory
- To sponsor a reforestation program to assure that our "forest" never lacks for trees
- To maintain our small parks
- To host an annual potluck supper and membership meeting
- To provide street snow removal in winter
- To pay for "Meet and Greets," jazz concerts in the park and parties for children

- To make sure every new neighbor is greeted by our welcoming committee with a basket of the world's best pastries and written information about the neighborhood
- To monitor real estate practices and keep a list of houses for sale and their selling prices
- To work with various city departments to assure that we receive adequate city services
- To enforce Sherwood Forest property restrictions, city zoning ordinances and historic district requirements
- To act as the liaison to our private security service
- To form coalitions with surrounding neighborhoods

The Sherwood Forest Patrol

When compared to private security services in other neighborhoods, the Sherwood Forest Patrol is unique for several reasons:

- The neighborhood, through the elected fifteen-member Board of Directors of the Sherwood Forest Association, contracts for the services of a professional security provider.
- At the end of each day's shift, the patrol driver on duty provides a written report to a manager who is one of our own residents.
- Our driver patrols exclusively in the Sherwood Forest neighborhood.

This unique arrangement gives the greatest possible control to our resident members, while leaving the day-to-day operations to a highly efficient professional security service. We have found that this system works: crime is low in Sherwood Forest. Among the services the patrol provides to its subscribers are:

- The ability to communicate with the security provider 24 hours a day
- House checks by a patrol officer if you hear a noise or see something suspicious
- Vacation checks of your house several times a day when you are away
- Patrol escort service into the neighborhood if requested in advance

- Traffic control in cooperation with the Detroit Police Department
- Special coverage when needed, as on Angels' Night or Halloween

Call to Order at 7:40 p.m. by Kim Tandy, at the home of Gail Rodwan.

Reading and Distribution of the Minutes of February 14, 2011. It was moved by Al Lewis and supported by Bob Gold, that the minutes of February 14, 2011, be approved as presented. Motion passed.

Treasurer's Report. Treasurer, Sue McMillan's Treasurer's Report was reviewed. It was moved by Bob Gold and supported by Lisa Williams, that the treasurer's report be approved as presented. Motion passed.

President's Report and Presentation of Proposed Changes to 19604 Shrewsbury

- President Tandy presented the site plan submitted by the homeowners at 19604 Shrewsbury. Proposed changes include a new walkway, new front porch, new garage, new rear patio and sun room. The board reviewed the plan in preparation for a visit of homeowners Michael Grundy, Joan Thrower and their contractor, Ilene Techner.
